Current Climate

In 2023 the number of people fleeing conflict, violence or human rights violations and persecution has drastically risen to an unprecedented level due to the war in Ukraine as well as other deadly conflicts.

72% of these refugees come from only five different countries.

6.8 million
Syrian/ Arab

For the first time in recorded history, the number of people forcibly displaced worldwide is now 103 million, and over 32.5 million are refugees.

Since February 2022, 12 million refugees from Ukraine have crossed the Polish border, with the largest number on 6th March – with more than 142,000 people.

Saint John Paul II stated that "as regards migrants and refugees, building conditions of peace means in practice being seriously committed to safeguarding first of all the right not to emigrate, that is, the right to live in peace and dignity in one's own country".

OVERSEAS HUMANITARIAN AND DEVELOPMENT ASSISTANCE

Australia's overseas development assistance in 2023-24 will be 0.19% of gross national income, a historic low.

OFFSHORE PROCESSING

Offshore processing is budgeted to cost \$1.5 billion over the forward estimates to 2026-27, despite only approximately 30 people remaining in Nauru and the Government's commitment to resettle all people to third countries. From July 2012 to June 2024, the Australian Government has spent \$12 billion on the policy of offshore processing. In total, approximately 4,183 people have been sent offshore during this time. The Budget papers also note that the Home Affairs Department is "at risk" of failing to meet its 2022-23 performance measure of resettling 95% of the 150 refugees due to go from offshore processing to New Zealand this year.

ASSISTANCE FOR PEOPLE SEEKING ASYLUM

Payments made through Services Australia for Asylum Seeker Support for 2022-23 are expected to be \$15 million, less than half of the \$36.9 million allocated in last year's Budget. For 2023-24, \$37 million has been allocated. Spending on this vital program has been cut by 95% since 2015-16, from \$300 million to just \$15 million.

Interesting fact: The number of refugee and humanitarian entrants welcomed to Australia since World War II will pass 950,000 in the early months of 2023.
